### Jesus in the Psalms, continued February 19, 2023

introduction: Luke 24:44-45

A number of the Psalms — written centuries in advance — point forward to Jesus' crucifixion. But there's more:

1. Jesus' \_\_\_\_\_ resurrection \_\_\_\_\_ from the dead was prophesied (Psalm 16:10).

The term “\_\_\_\_\_ Your Holy One \_\_\_\_\_,” used in Psalm 16:10, is the third most common term for the Messiah in the Old Testament.

Psalm 16:10 is \_\_\_\_\_ quoted \_\_\_\_\_ and applied to Jesus in Acts 2:25-31 and Acts 13:33-37.

2. Jesus' resurrection confirmed Him as \_\_\_\_\_ Lord \_\_\_\_\_ and Christ — the Messiah (Act 2:36).

1) It was \_\_\_\_\_ impossible \_\_\_\_\_ for Jesus to remain dead (Acts 2:22-24).

personal application: Emphasize Jesus' \_\_\_\_\_ resurrection \_\_\_\_\_ as you talk to other people.

In the book of Acts, the central \_\_\_\_\_ theme \_\_\_\_\_ of the witnessing by Jesus' disciples and their defense when put on trial is that He is alive (Acts 3:15, 26; Acts 4:10; Acts 5:30; Acts 10:40; Acts 13:30-37; Acts 17:31; Acts 23:6; Acts 24:21; Acts 26:8).
